Noted Novelist and Poet Jennifer Givhan to Headline 2026 New Mexico Writers Annual Dinner

Mexican American and Indigenous poet and novelist Jennifer Givhan will speak at the 2026 New Mexico Writers Annual Dinner at La Fonda on the Plaza on April 30.

Givhan's latest novel, *Salt Bones* (Mulholland/Little, Brown, 2025), recently appeared on *Publishers Weekly*'s Best Books of 2025 list in the Mystery/Thriller category. NMW Board Member Deborah Jackson Taffa described this book as "the perfect blend of political horror and other-worldly nightmares." Two of Givhan's earlier novels—*Trinity Sight* and *Jubilee*—were finalists for the Arizona-New Mexico Book Awards, and *Trinity Sight* received the 2020 Southwest Book Award. She is also the



author of five poetry collections, including *Belly to the Brutal* (Wesleyan University Press, 2022).

Givhan's work is known for its exploration of magical realism and surrealism, the dark supernatural, and motherhood. "I write about the violence against women and mothers on the border," she says, "but also about the resilience and strength we women and mothers evince every day of our lives."

Her honors include a poetry fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts, a PEN/Rosenthal Emerging Voices Fellowship, and the Frost Place Latinx Scholarship. She was the 2024 Visiting Professor of Creative Writing at The University of New Mexico, and she lives and writes in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Hundreds Celebrate Local Authors at Inaugural Southern New Mexico Book Festival



More than 800 attendees and 60 authors and vendors celebrated New Mexican literature at the inaugural Southern New Mexico Book Festival, which took place at Doña Ana Community College's East Mesa Campus in Las Cruces on October 11.

Festival-goers were able to attend more than a dozen author readings, as well as numerous workshops on topics ranging from researching historical novels to building

miniature bookcases. Younger festival-goers, too, had plenty to do; the Vamos Niños mobile children's museum offered "STEAM-powered exhibits," and the Children's Reading Alliance distributed more than 200 free children's books. Local authors were on-hand throughout the day to sell copies of their books, as were several New Mexico—and West Texas—based organizations, including Colorful Chapters Bookstore, the Doña Ana Community College Library, and the New Mexico Book Association.

New Mexico Writers, which recently announced the results of the New Mexico Book Awards, displayed winning and finalist titles from Southern New Mexico authors and other authors attending the festival. In addition to these newly honored books, the organization's table included books by NMW board members, and NMW staff shared information about the grant program, Rising Writers, the upcoming Annual Dinner at La Fonda on the Plaza, and more.

The festival was organized by a planning committee that included several members of Las Cruces Writers, a local group that operates under the tagline "Writers Helping Writers," as well as Liz Vega, the event manager for Visit Las Cruces. "The original idea came about from an event the Las Cruces Writers hosted with the Friends of the Thomas Branigan Memorial Library called 'Celebrate Authors' or 'Celebration of Authors' in different decade-long iterations," said Vega. "One of the planning members—local author George Pintar—of that event came to me in early 2024 with the idea to morph the event into something bigger for the community and the region at large."

The 2025 festival did indeed serve both the Las Cruces community and the larger region, drawing in hundreds over the course of the day from Southern New Mexico, West Texas, and beyond. And, while this was the Southern New Mexico Book Festival's first year, Las Cruces is not unfamiliar with book festivals; the annual Border Book Festival, which was founded in 1995, ran in Mesilla and Las Cruces for twenty years before its closure in 2015. Fittingly, the Southern New Mexico Book Festival's closing reception featured a discussion by the Border Book Festival's cofounder, local literary legend Denise Chávez.

Meanwhile, the festival's organizers are already looking ahead to next year. Plans are "still in the works," Vega said—but she hopes the Southern New Mexico Book Festival will be an annual event every fall.

Vaunda Micheaux Nelson recently received the inaugural Paul Rhetts Award from the New Mexico Book Awards for her middle-grade novel in verse, *Radiant*, which follows fifth-grader Cooper Dale as she navigates her primarily white Pittsburgh community in 1963. Nelson's previous work has received many honors, including the Coretta Scott King Award and the WWA Spur Award. *The New Mexico Writer* recently had the opportunity to ask Nelson about *Radiant*, the Paul Rhetts Award, and her experience as a New Mexico writer. This interview has been edited for concision.

WAUNDA MICHEAUX NELSON Winser of the Coreta Scott Ring Award

What does it mean to you to have received the inaugural Paul Rhetts Award—for the most highly rated book in the 2025 New Mexico Book Awards—for *Radiant*?

It is truly a gift. Paul Rhetts (and his late wife, Barbe Awalt) have supported New Mexico authors and readers for decades through LPD Press and Rio Grande Books, through founding the New Mexico Book Awards, and through the New Mexico Book Co-op. I have been honored with New Mexico Book Awards in the past, even receiving Best-in-Show one year. All have been wonderful, but there's something extra special about being the very first Paul Rhetts Award recipient. My heart is full.

What were some of the rewards and challenges of writing a novel in verse?

Writing *Radiant* was scary and wonderful. I fell in love with the format in 1990 when I read my very first verse novel—*Judy Scuppernong* by Brenda Seabrooke. I never imagined I could write one myself but was intrigued by the challenge and curious to see what I could do with it.

Finding that not-too-much, just-enough, sweet spot was challenging at times, and making decisions about the order of things, where particular poems should fall in the story, was hard. Spacing and line breaks—things I never needed to consider when writing prose—were rather perplexing. But I liked trying something different, entering an intimidating, yet exciting, new way to tell a story.

I enjoy novels that leave lots of space for readers to fill in the blanks in their own ways. I love the subtlety, the power in what isn't said or spelled out. By its very nature, this is what poetry does and is. It was a marvelous journey.

NM Writers Celebrates the Winners & Finalists of the 2025 NM Book Awards



Pasatiempo Writing Contest Now Accepting Entries Statewide

The annual *Pasatiempo* Writing Contest is open for submissions through November 14. This is the first year that residents throughout the state of New Mexico are eligible to enter, and the contest now accepts up to five entries per individual.

The categories are Fiction (1,200 words max), judged by NMW Board Member Deborah Jackson Taffa; Nonfiction/Essay/Memoir (1,200 words max), judged by Caroline Fraser; and Poetry (40 lines max), judged by 2022-2025 New Mexico Poet Laureate Lauren Camp. Bestselling mystery writer Anne Hillerman will judge the Grand Prize, choosing from the category judges' top selections.

New Literary Arts Fund to Support Literary Nonprofits

Last week, a coalition of seven charitable foundations, including the Santa Fe-based Lannan Foundation, announced the launch of the Literary Arts Fund. This fund, initiated



by the Mellon Foundation, plans to distribute at least \$50 million over the next five years to US-based nonprofit or fiscally sponsored literary organizations and publishers in an effort "to dramatically boost the essential yet critically underfunded nonprofit literary arts field in the United States." 


