Lisa McCoy Steps Into Executive Director Role at New Mexico Writers

Lisa McCoy is the new executive director of New Mexico Writers (NMW), marking the organization's first leadership transition. McCoy's previous role as the NMW administrator involved her with the programs and the board. "My life-long passion is cheering on the creative arts, and I am thrilled to be part of NMW's inspirational group of writers supporting writers," McCoy said. "Stepping into the executive director role allows me to level up my support of the NMW board and our programs, which in turn allows me to be even more involved in the New Mexico literary community."



Former Executive Director James McGrath Morris has returned to the NMW board while also moving into the role of development director. NMW was founded in 2016 by Morris, who described its beginnings as unplanned. "New Mexico Writers was an accident," said Morris. "In the fall of 2016, I came back from the Camino de Santiago walk, and I met with Lucy Moore. I said, 'I've got time on my hands. We ought to do what we've talked about before, which is try to bring, at this point, just Santa Fe writers together.'"

What began as a dinner at La Fonda on the Plaza quickly grew into an organization focused on connecting writers and providing tangible support. Over time, NMW expanded its reach to serve writers across the entire state of New Mexico and greater Navajo Nation, developing programs that include writing grants, a monthly publication, the networking dinner event, and, as of 2025, the book awards program.

As Morris steps into the role of development director, his focus will shift toward long-term sustainability. McCoy says she plans to carry forward the values established under previous leadership while continuing to grow the organization's reach. "Jamie models generosity and enthusiasm for supporting the local literary community," she said. "I wish to reflect those same values in my role as executive director of NMW."

Looking ahead, McCoy identified "growing the awareness of NMW and our programs and continuing to expand our reach to all areas of this wonderfully creative state of New Mexico," as a key priority.

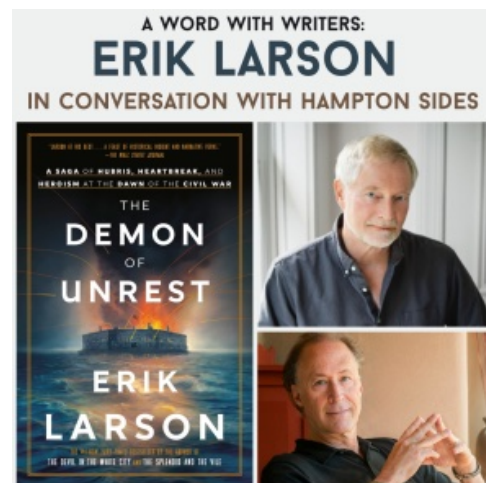
McCoy will continue as the director of the New Mexico Book Awards, a nearly two-decades-old book competition, now entering its second year under NMW management.

In December, Saleema Ishq was appointed editor of *The New Mexico Writer*. Ishq is an Albuquerque-based fiction author with a background in copywriting, editing, and social media marketing. She will oversee editorial content for *The New Mexico Writer* and NMW's social media accounts.

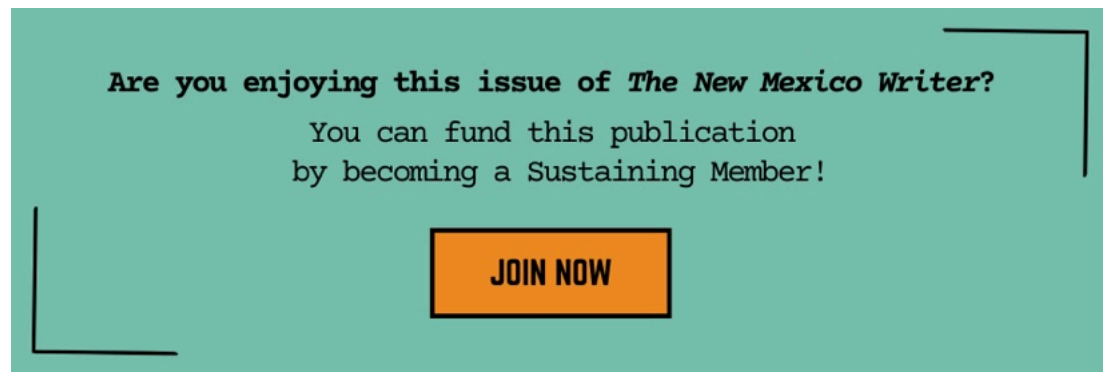

NMW Annual Dinner Returns to Historic La Fonda on the Plaza

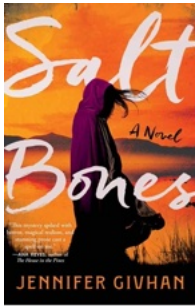
The New Mexico Writers (NMW) annual dinner will return to La Fonda on the Plaza on Thursday, April 30, continuing a tradition that dates back to the organization’s beginnings—the first annual dinner was held at La Fonda in 2017. The event brings together writers from across the state for an evening of networking and NMW grantee recognition.



Why La Fonda? “Literarily speaking, it’s a historic place,” said NMW founder James McGrath Morris. “Willa Cather and D.H. Lawrence stayed there. It has a lot of literary connections, so it’s a perfect venue for us.”

The dinner was conceived as a way to connect writers who might not otherwise meet and has since become one of NMW’s mainstay programs. “We ceased using the dinner as a fundraiser because we recognized it was a networking event,” Morris said. “It allowed an aspiring poet to walk up to a Pulitzer Prize winner or the Poet Laureate of the nation and say, ‘How did you handle such and such?’”

To preserve this spirit, Morris said that ticket prices are set to cover the cost of putting on the event. Attendees are invited to contribute to a program that helps subsidize tickets for writers who may need financial support to attend. In 2025, these donations subsidized dinner tickets for ten writers. 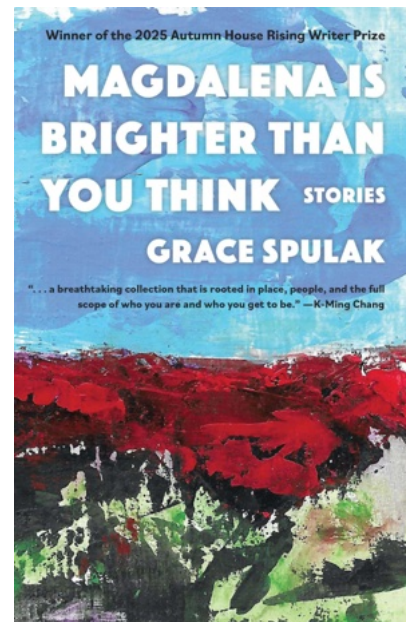

NMW Grant Supports Debut Story Collection Ahead of 2026 Release

A debut short story collection by 2024 New Mexico Writers (NMW) Grantee Grace Spulak is set for publication following the author’s receipt of grant support.

Magdalena Is Brighter Than You Think will be released on April 21, 2026, by Autumn House Press as the winner of their Rising Writer Prize. The stories draw from Spulak’s personal experiences. “This collection was inspired by my own experiences of violence and trauma, my work as an attorney representing children and young people in rural New Mexico, and my own experiences growing up poor and queer in semi-rural New Mexico,” she said.

New Mexico plays a central role in the collection’s exploration of resilience. “My starting place for these ideas was the New Mexico landscape that forms the backdrop of so many stories in this collection, harsh, yet full of possibility,” Spulak said. “I have always found hope in the landscape’s strange beauty: the way it looks dead on first glance, the way living things take on unexpected colors, the way life can survive for years with no rain. My connection to landscape helped me understand resilience and the way that survival often looks different than we expect.”



Spulak received an NMW grant in 2024, which supported essential research for this and future projects. “The New Mexico Writers grant allowed me to do some travel research that was related both to some of the stories in this collection and one of the novels that I’m working on,” she said. “For such a place-based collection, it was critical to be able to spend time in rural spaces and observe and document.”



Beyond the financial support, Spulak emphasized the validation that came with the award. “Receiving the grant made me feel that this collection and my writing as a whole had value and importance to people beyond myself.”

Spulak encourages writers who are considering applying for an NMW grant to do so. “I always tell people who are on the fence about applying for anything they should apply,” she said. “I would also encourage people to think about the specific needs they have as a writer and how the grant might help with that.”

Grantees have used grant support for travel, equipment, software, workshops, and more. Applications for the 2026 New Mexico Writers grants will be accepted until Friday, March 6, 2026. Additional information is available on the NMW website [here](#).

Inside Cairo’s Literary Landscape



New Mexico Writers (NMW) Board Member and 2022 Grantee Zahra Marwan recently attended the Cairo Art Book Fair as part of Akkaz Collective, an artist-run publishing house.

“The number of educated people from various countries throughout the Middle East rendering their sentiments and academic research into such beautiful formats from table to table and the number of enthusiastic readers was thrilling,” Marwan said.

Marwan described conversations with artists who shared how stories emerge from lived experience.

“They shared intricacies of village cultures, specificities from their neighborhoods, and how they built stories on that,” she said. “They showed illustrations from their books and the real-life inspiration behind their compositions and how remarkably subtle yet obvious it is when shared.”

NMW Board Chair, JJ Amaworo Wilson, called Cairo home for 18 months in the early 1990s at the beginning of his writing journey. Amaworo Wilson recalled spending time at the legendary El-Fishawi Coffee House, a gathering place for writers and intellectuals, including the Nobel Prize winning novelist Naguib Mahfouz.

“It was in El-Fishawi Coffee House that I took notes on the terrible Cairo earthquake of 1992. I would later turn those notes into a piece called ‘What I Found Amongst the Ruins’ that was published in a Penguin anthology in 2000,” Amaworo Wilson said.

“Living in Cairo opened my eyes to a whole, vibrant world full of history and beauty and struggle.”

Marwan noted that many artists she met at the book fair operate outside conventional institutions, using alternative publishing models to navigate censorship and limited access to funding. Amaworo Wilson and Marwan’s observations reflect a shared experience among creatives everywhere and align with NMW’s focus on building community and providing resources for writers.

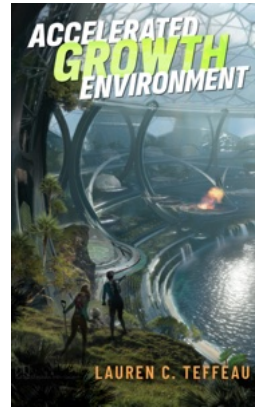

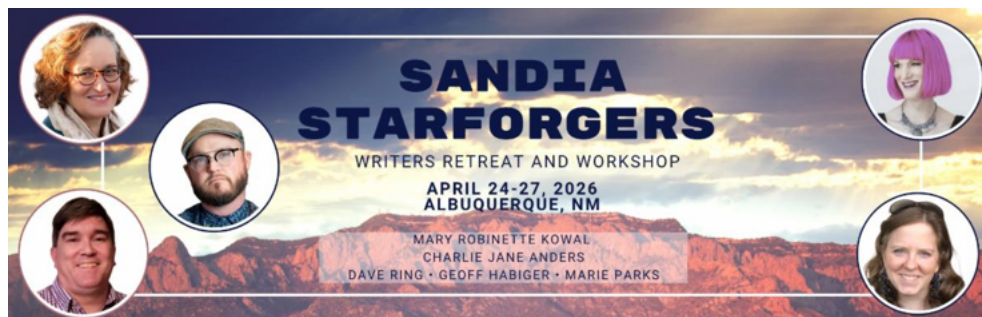
